A Pillar of the Community

Peggy King Jorde '76 Recognized by Preservation Society of New York



Last week, Peggy King Jorde '76 received the Pillar of New York Award from the Preservation Society of New York. Peggy has spent decades working in cultural heritage and preservation, and was instrumental in protecting and creating New York City's African Burial Ground National Monument in lower Manhattan. "It's a human experience. It goes beyond race," Peggy says of the site. "These are sacred sites with incredible dimension and significance." In recent years, Peggy has worked to preserve an unmarked mass burial ground on St. Helena in the South Atlantic,

where an estimated 9,000 formerly enslaved Africans are buried. That experience is captured in the PBS/POV film, A Story of Bones, for which Peggy acted as consulting producer.

Muller would like to deepen the art department's interdisciplinary collaboration by, for instance, co-teaching a course with a science teacher or



coordinating units of study with other classes to facilitate overlapping lessons.

"We have complex problems in the world to solve right now, and you need a lot of different ways and approaches to thinking about those problems," Muller said. "And the more that we can get people having conversations and problem-solving across disciplines, I think that we have a better chance at our future."

Putney broke ground on its new dorms in 2022. Less than two years later, students and faculty have started to move in. The spaces are bright, welcoming, clean, efficient, and warm (or cool, depending on the season). Putney recognizes and thanks our early investors in these dorms, Sarah '60 and Geoffrey Gund, Allen and Judy Freedman P'83, G'16, '22, and the Roaring Brook Foundation, whose generous support gave the project essential momentum and financial backing. Our gratitude goes out to so many others who added to their generous support.

The Sarah and Geoffrey Gund House, named by Geoffrey in remembrance of Sarah, welcomed its first students last week. Hepper House, named by Sarah and Geoffrey in honor of Hepper Caldwell '46, will be complete in the next month or so. In all, the dorms will house 44 students and four faculty families, and will move Putney closer to its goal of becoming a net-zero campus. Moreover, the dorms support the vision outlined in the master plan of moving Putney's residential program to the outer rim of campus, and centering academic, arts, athletic, and student support facilities within the heart of campus.

Moving Forward with Sing it Forward

Putney thanks everyone who has supported the Sing it *Forward* campaign thus far. With \$27.5 million raised of our initial \$35M goal, we are seeing the impact of your generosity; from our new dorms, to funds that support the student experience, to the seeds that will grow our new theater. Putney secured a low-interest mortgage to allow the dorm project to move forward; that said, Putney's lack of institutional debt has been a key to our financial stability, and we hope to erase this debt as quickly as possible.
